Question 1

My professional career consists of 29 years in Education. During those three decades I moved from classroom instruction, to supervision, to administration. During my career I earned a total of four degrees. For my last employer, ITT Educational Services, I was responsible for quality control for a national chair of 26 post-secondary technical schools.

Providing a quality education at the lowest possible cost was our goal. That mission parallels the mission of CVEA.

Question 2

CVEA is a stand alone, remote utility unable to rely on other sources for generation. For that reason, even when we can develop green power, we must maintain the capability to produce electricity in both districts in the event our primary source is out of operation or some catastrophic event presents our being able to transmit from one region to the other. Long-term goals should include development of AFFORDABLE and SUSTAINABLE alternatives to diesel fuel.

Ouestion 3

We must continue to develop plans for how we will be generating electricity 20 years from now.

We must make that generation as environmentally friendly as possible, and at the lowest possible price.

As evidenced by media announcements our members are expressing very real changing views on energy as reflected in how co-op consumers use electricity. This is evidenced by the addition of energy saving devices in our homes.
