

October is National Cooperative Month. Since 1930, Cooperative Month has celebrated the fact that cooperatives make a difference because they are different.

Democratically governed businesses, cooperatives are organized under the Seven Cooperative Principles, anchoring them firmly in the communities they serve and ensuring that they are closely regulated by their consumers.

#### **Seven Cooperative Principles:**

- Voluntary and Open Membership
- Democratic Member Control
- Member's Economic Participation
- Autonomy and Independence
- Education, Training, and Information
- Cooperation Among Cooperatives
- Commitment to Community

Copper Valley Electric Association (CVEA) and Copper Valley Telephone Cooperative (CVTC) exemplify 'cooperation among cooperatives' by working together to promote the cooperative difference.

During this year's Cooperative Month, we will focus on our 'commitment to the community'. CVEA and CVTC have a strong commitment to the communities where our members work and live.

Demonstrating this commitment is a business principle that CVEA and CVTC practice year round through participation in economic development programs, charitable giving, educational activities, and other community involvement.

Your local cooperatives and the neighbors who work there contribute to the community in countless ways. Combined, CVEA and CVTC donate over \$30,000 and hundreds of man hours each year to support organizations and events.

Below are a few examples of how CVEA and CVTC make a difference.

## **Emergency Services**

Each year, CVEA and CVTC support the annual Copper River Emergency Medical Services (CREMS) radio auction to raise funds for a much needed new ambulance.

### Recycling

Both of your local cooperatives care about recycling. This year, cooperative representatives worked as part of Rotary to implement an aluminum can recycling program in Valdez.

Each year, CVEA and CVTC sponsor Recycling Our Areas Resources (ROAR) in the Copper Valley. Throughout the months of July and October, cooperative employees volunteer their time to visit the recycling center and process paper and cans.

## **American Cancer Society**

Not only do CVEA and CVTC sponsor the Valdez Relay for Life, but this year, CVEA joined forces with CVTC to put together a team with a goal to walk the walk for the entire 24 hour event and to raise money for cancer research and support programs.

Fourteen employees and several

family members walked during the event and the team raised over \$2,600.

## Economic Development and Quality of Life

Many community events are organized to not only enhance the economy but to preserve the excellent quality of life the residents of Valdez and the Copper Basin enjoy.

This year, Copper Valley Electric sponsored the prize for the Rookie Finisher during the Copper Basin 300 dog sled race and provided auction items for the Clean Up Day in the Native Village of Tazlina.

Copper Valley Telephone sponsored the Valdez Fish Derbies, Valdez Gold Rush, & the July Fun Run in Glennallen.

#### **Youth Programs and Education**

Youth and education are very important to your local cooperatives.

In 2008, CVEA provided gift items for the Gakona Village Council Youth Environmental Day Camp and donated funds to the Kenny Lake Library.

Each year CVEA donates to the Valdez Senior Class graduation celebration intended to keep Valdez youth off the streets and safe.

CVEA also offers a prize each year for the Best Electrical Project during the Valdez Science Fair and the coop's engineering manager volunteers as a science fair judge.

Annually, CVTC sponsors Junior Achievement, Close Up and the kid's Halloween safety program.

sponsor the Prince William Sound Community College (PWSCC) Scholarship Fundraiser.
