# COPPER VALLEY ELECTRIC ASSOCIATION, INC. COPPER BASIN DISTRICT MEETING

Glennallen Community Center May 1, 2025

#### 1. <u>Call to Order</u>

President Lon Rake called the 2025 Meeting of the Copper Valley Electric Association Membership to order at 6 p.m. on Tuesday, April 29, 2025, in Valdez, Alaska, and was recessed at 7:27 p.m., and called back to session in Glennallen, Alaska on Thursday, May 1, 2025, at 6 p.m. He thanked everyone for attending the annual meeting of the members. He introduced the Board of Directors who were in attendance: Vice President Delaquito, Treasurer Stark, Director Maslen, Director Hess, Director Vereline, and Director Saxe. Secretary Dan Stowe was not present. Vice President Delaquito was appointed Secretary Pro Tem due to Secretary Stowe's absence. CEO Jaime Matthews and Executive Assistant Sara Horvath were introduced.

President Rake explained the process of drawing door prizes and reminded everyone they must be present to win any prize.

#### 2. Reports

## A. Report of Quorum

Secretary Stowe reported that the Copper Basin District had 1,216 active members. A minimum of 50 registered members are required for a quorum. As of 6 p.m., a quorum was established with 138 members registered.

#### B. Notice of Meeting

Secretary Pro Tem Delaquito read the Notice of Meeting and reported that meeting notices and ballots were mailed to all 2,804 active members on Tuesday, March 26, 2025, in accordance with CVEA Bylaws.

# C. Reading and Approval of Minutes

Secretary Stowe asked for a motion from the floor to dispense of reading the 2024 Annual Meeting minutes as they were available for review online prior to the meeting.

MOTION Ms. Shilah Butler moved to dispense with the reading of the 2024 minutes and to accept the minutes as presented

Ms. Shannon Saavedra seconded.

Motion passed.

## D. <u>Financial Report</u>

Treasurer Stark said the financial report was included in the 2024 Annual Report and referred to the balance sheet. He reported the Cooperative ended the year financially sound with assets of \$86.4 million.

In December, CVEA paid out \$797,302 in capital credits. Member equity at yearend was \$24 million, which equates to 28 percent of assets.

Moving to the income statement, Treasurer Stark said fuel costs were 30 percent of the total revenue collected for the year, which was about 3.7 percent lower than 2023. This was mainly due to the average cost of north slope crude oil being \$2 less per barrel in 2024, in addition to 4 percent more hydroelectric generation compared to the prior year.

Eighty percent of heat revenues from the Cogeneration Project are returned to members as a credit on the bill to help offset fuel costs. In 2024, a total of \$2.1 million was given back to members.

CVEA received a total of \$906,879 in grant funding related to power generation assets. This helped contribute to CVEA ending 2024 with \$655,004 in margins.

#### E. <u>Election Results</u>

The Copper Basin Credentials & Election Committee members were Ms. Shannon Saavedra, Chairperson; Mrs. Mary Ellen Bedrick, Secretary; Ms. Debbie Lorence, Ms. Sue Roscovius, and Ms. Jodi Carty.

Ms. Shannon Saavedra reported that for the Copper Basin District, 1,216 ballot packages were mailed to active members. There were 288 envelopes returned; 276 were validated and counted. The results were as follows:

Andrew Hess 256 Yvette Delaquito 258

The Copper Basin District membership elected Mr. Andy Hess and Ms. Yvette Delaquito each to a three-year term.

Ms. Shannon Saavedra reported that in the Valdez District 1,588 ballot packages were mailed to active members. There were 228 envelopes returned; 204 were validated and counted. The results were as follows:

Dan Stowe 204

The Valdez District membership re-elected Mr. Dan Stowe to a three-year term.

Ms. Shannon Saavedra announced the winner of the Valdez election ballot drawing for a \$50 energy credit to the winner's May electric bill.

## F. Foundation Report

CEO Matthews provided the CVEA Community Foundation report on President Delaquito's behalf. The Community Foundation was established to allow Copper Valley Electric to provide educational scholarships to individuals and to make contributions to educational, scientific, and charitable organizations in our communities.

Funding of the Foundation comes from unclaimed capital credits that have reverted to the Cooperative, investments, and from members who have made one-time or recurring donations. In 2024, the Foundation will be awarded approximately \$28,762 in contributions to 19 nonprofit organizations in the communities.

CEO Matthews reported that the Foundation was pleased to provide funding to the following organizations: Wrangell Institute for Science and the Environment, Herman Hutchens Elementary School Fifth Grade Field Trip, Copper River EMS, Copper River Watershed Project, Copper River Basin Child Advocacy Center, Copper River Hockey Club, Glennallen High School Geography and Travel Class, Valdez Youth Wrestling Club, Valdez Senior Center, Valdez Adventure Alliance, Valdez Sound Wellness Alliance Network, Valdez Youth Court, Glennallen Elementary Library – Battle of the Books, Glennallen Community Library, Kenny Lake Library, Upstream Learning, Glennallen Activities Booster Club, and Valdez Imagination Library.

In addition to funding local nonprofits, the Community Foundation provided over \$5,000 to support the senior communities in both districts through CVEA's Senior Holiday Giving Program.

Community members are solicited to participate on the Scholarship Selection Committee in their district. These members volunteer their time to support the Foundation's Scholarship Program and the Cooperative. CEO Matthews thanked the following members who volunteered to support the Foundation by serving on the Copper Basin Scholarship Committee: Ms. Brenda Riffel, Chairperson; Ms. Ann Crow, and Mr. Kirk Howard.

CEO Matthews announced the Copper Basin scholarship winners as follows: one \$2,000 general scholarship to Mr. Joseph Hauptman; two \$1,000 general scholarships to Ms. Madison Carlton and Ms. Madeline Hamby; and one \$2,000 continuing education scholarship was awarded to Mr. Andrew Carlson.

#### G. Chief Executive Officer Report

CEO Matthews thanked members for attending the meeting. She summarized the seven Cooperative Principles in relation to CVEA and the work carried out at the Co-op. The Seven Cooperative Principles are: Open and Voluntary Membership—those we serve; Democratic Member Control—the election process; Cooperation Among Cooperatives—working together; Autonomy and Independence—the ability to make decisions and self-sustain; Members' Economic Participation—which includes rates and capital credits; Concern for Community—such as CVEA's Co-op Month activities; and Education and Training—not only for employees, but also for the Board of Directors. These core principles stem from the values shared by all co-ops, which CVEA also embraces: honesty, openness, social responsibility, and caring for others.

CEO Matthews provided an update on the Strategic Plan, developed in 2021. She reviewed the five main goals—financial strength, system reliability, employer of choice, reducing diesel dependence, and member advocacy—and reported on progress made in each area.

CEO Matthews offered a moment for any questions or comments from the audience.

She also acknowledged President Rake for his dedication to the industry and the cooperative through his service on the National Western Pacific Power Association (NWPPA) Board of Trustees.

# 7. <u>Drawing of Door Prizes</u>

President Rake said that if there was no further business to come before the Membership, the 2025 Annual Meeting of Members would adjourn following the grand prize giveaway.

Vice President Delaquito facilitated the Customer Service drawing and the Split-the-Pot drawing. She reported that the Split-the-Pot fundraiser generated a total of \$661 for the Foundation and \$331 would be awarded to the winning ticketholder and \$330 would be deposited to the Foundation to help fund programs and initiatives in our communities.
